Compassionate care at Victoria Hospice focuses on what matters most to people in their dying time. Sometimes, what matters most might be a nice warm bath.

A generous donation has provided supportive equipment that allows a person to safely lie down in a bath - a nice addition to the existing bath chair on the Inpatient Unit.

It's gift that holds a lot of meaning for donor Dana Wessel, whose contribution came to Victoria Hospice through the Victoria Foundation.

"Victoria Hospice was so very supportive to us as we were caring for my mother in our home last year. My mother loved her baths, and it became increasingly difficult to maneuver her into the tub. One of the last pleasures in her long (104 years) life was a warm water soak about a week before her peaceful death. We are delighted to know that others will be able to enjoy their baths in the comfort of their end-of-life Victoria Hospice home."

Focusing all my love on him

Support from Victoria Hospice inspired Debbie Greentree to raise more than \$2,300 by participating in Hike for Hospice last year. We're grateful to Debbie for sharing her experience here.

My husband, Lynn Greentree, had a gift for making people feel important. He was a unique and treasured individual and he always found the good in others. Whenever any healthcare folks came to see us, he always would smile and show an interest in them and ask what they were up to.

Lynn passed at the age of 71 in March 2022, just eleven months after receiving a cancer diagnosis. He seemed able to accept his fate, telling me we've been dealt a bad hand, but life goes on. For me, it's still hard to accept. He was so healthy - I thought we had another ten or fifteen years.

I was consumed with worry from the moment Lynn was diagnosed. My concerns were relieved through support from the Victoria Hospice Palliative

Every reason to love

Just because you have loved, it doesn't mean you can't love again.

That's the philosophy of newlyweds Maureen Connolly and Miles Maxie.

Both experienced long and loving marriages and were devastated when their spouses died. But a chance meeting in a Victoria Hospice grief support group led to friendship, and a few years later – a wedding.

Their individual but shared experiences of caregiving and bereavement established common ground early on.

"We really understood each other and understood each other's pain," Maureen says.

Miles's wife, Linda, who died in 2018, and Maureen's husband, Chris, who died in 2019, both received end-of-life care at Victoria Hospice. After caring for their spouses at home, both Miles and Maureen were relieved by the compassionate support they found on the Inpatient Unit.

"When you're caregiving at home, you're busy and you worry about all the things you need to do," Miles says. "When we got to hospice, Linda said, 'Now I have my husband back'. We were able to just visit and be together. I'd come early in the morning and have breakfast with her, and sometimes bring her barbequed bacon."

Maureen's experience was similar. "It was the first time I didn't need to run around doing the laundry and the cleaning," she

says. "Hospice was able to take over and make sure Chris was very comfortable."

Miles and Maureen's new life includes all their cherished memories of Linda and Chris.

"We loved our spouses with all our hearts. We had every reason to love them, and we still do. But that doesn't have to stop us from loving someone else." Maureen says.

Response Team as his illness progressed. Their regular visits and phone calls enabled Lynn to fulfill his wish to remain at home for as long as possible before receiving end-of-life care on the Inpatient Unit.

When Lynn arrived at hospice he seemed at peace and relaxed and no longer worrying about me helping him. Thanks to the volunteers and staff, I was able to focus all my love on him.

At hospice, they really understand where you are at on this journey even if you're feeling despair, sadness, and not really accepting the outcome. The conversations we had with the counsellors on the unit helped me and my family members feel seen, heard and cared for, the same way Lynn always did.

After Lynn passed, I took advantage of the grief counselling sessions offered at Victoria Hospice, and also joined a Walking Through Grief Group and I found people who were going through the same process as me.

I participated in Hike for Hospice in honour of Lynn last spring. They give so much at Victoria Hospice, and I wanted to give back. It did feel strange asking for donations, but I did it, and I was successful. I was floored by all the support I received but it's such a worthy cause. As much as none of us want to be seriously sick or need end-of-life care, most of us are going to need this service at some point.

Each year, more than 5,000 donors help raise the funds needed to support patients and families through donations, special events, and gifts by Will. Their generosity provides the compassionate end-of-life care that makes Victoria Hospice so special.
